At K12 Tutoring, we believe the classroom teacher is the most important influence on a student's academic growth. Our tutors are not a replacement for classroom instruction. They serve as an extension of the support and expertise you already provide every day.

- Tutors are an extension of your classroom, not a replacement for it. They provide extra practice, skill-building, and encouragement so students can be more successful in class. Together, teachers and tutors form one learning team focused on student growth.
- Your encouragement is one of the strongest predictors of student engagement. When teachers talk about tutoring, encourage attendance, and connect sessions to classroom goals, students are more likely to participate and benefit from the program.

Teacher Guide to Student Success

✓ When introducing tutoring or answering questions from students:

- Tutoring is extra support, not extra work.
- Your tutor is part of your learning team.
- Tutoring helps you practice skills, build confidence, and make progress.
- Your tutor and I are working together to support your success.

✓ Encourage Consistent Attendance

- Connect tutoring to class goals.
- Give quick reminders before sessions.
- Ask students: "What did you learn in tutoring this week?"
- Recognize consistent attendance and effort.

✓ Help Students & Families Get Support Quickly

Teachers are often the first people students and families turn to when they need help. While you don't need to troubleshoot issues yourself, knowing where to direct them can help students stay engaged and avoid missing sessions.

Common Questions Teachers Can Help Answer

"When is my tutoring session?"

- Students can view their tutoring schedule on their Launch Pad.

"I need a different tutoring time."

- Families can submit a [Schedule Request Form](#) (subject to availability and school approval).

"I need help logging in or accessing tutoring."

- Direct students and families to the K12 Tutoring Help Center/Support resources.
